INTRODUCTION

- Japan will host the Tokyo Olympic & Paralympic Games (TOPG) in 2020.
- Having many volunteers is necessary to host such a mega sport event. (e.g. 70,000 volunteers in 2012 London)



The **purpose** of this study was to examine the relationship between the intention of volunteer activities at TOPG and the experience of volunteer activities (i.e., event- and clubbased activities).

Research Question

Does the impact of volunteer experiences on TOPG volunteering intentions differ across types of volunteer activities?

LIT.REVIEW

- Volunteers are necessary to host big events (Yamaguchi, 1998).
- ✓ Volunteers' attitudes differed depending on their roles (i.e., managing vs on-site staff) (Kitamura et al, 2005).
- Coaching volunteers appear to join community sport clubs (Takekuma, 1997).

METHOD

The 2014 Sasakawa Sports Foundation National Sports-Life Survey

- Japanese people (20 years-old +)
- N = 2,000
- Drop-off questionnaire survey
- Multiple regression analyses
 (IVs: Past Experiences, DVs: Intention)

RESULTS



Participants' intention for the Olympics (M = 1.57, SD = 0.79)
Participants' intention for the Paralympics (M = 1.53, SD = 0.74)
(Participants answered by using a 4-point scale [4 = Extremely, 1 = Not at All])




FIGURE1: Results of Multiple Regression Analyses (Event-Based




FIGURE2: Results of Multiple Regression Analyses (Club-Based)

DISCUSSION

►Event-Based

Only "Organizing Event Sites" was positively related to the intentions, because:

 The responsibilities accompanied by this activity wouldn't be too much for volunteers.

▶Club-Based

"Assisting Coaches & Referees" and "Organizing Sites & Administrative Work" were positively related to both Olympic and Paralympic intentions, because:

 Both are easy to imagine for people by having similar experiences at their clubs (Takekuma, 1997).

"Picking-Up/Dropping-Off" was positively related to the Paralympic intention, because:

- Knowledge and skills are necessarily for Paralympic volunteering (Oyama, 2011; Tani, 2003).
- It is hard for people to learn knowledge and skills at their clubs.

CONCLUSION

The impact of past volunteer experiences on TOPG volunteering intentions differs across types of volunteer activities.



The volunteer recruitment process for TOPG will be more efficient and successful.
